"When I am afraid, I put my trust in you."



Parent/Carer Important information:

From 1st April 2024, eligible working parents of 2-year-olds will be entitled to 15 hours of free childcare and the DfE are recommending that parents start applying for their codes from mid-January.

Parents/carers are now able to apply for a code for 15 hours of free childcare, starting from 1 April 2024. Parents have to apply for a 2-year-old code via the Gov.uk site and sign in and reconfirm every three months. To apply they need to create a childcare account (if they don't already have one) using the link below.

What we have been learning this week...

ANTIGUA	This week in Antigua we've had lots of fun celebrating Pancake Day and Chinese New Year! We tasted new flavours and dishes. These included decorating pancakes with sticky syrup
	and sour lemon as well as trying Chinese noodles and prawn crackers.
	The children wrote shopping lists and ventured to our role-play shop to buy all of the ingredients we needed. The children have been singing our Pancake rap, boogying to wake-up shake-up, flipping play-dough pancakes and making traditional Chinese lanterns.
ST LUCIA	This week in St Lucia we have been celebrating Chinese New Year! We learnt the zodiac story of all the animals racing to cross the river! This year it was the year of the dragon and it is a special year as it is a leap year! We created Chinese Lanterns, we followed traditions and wrote a wish for the wishing tree, explored Chinese clothing, and chopsticks! We are making pancakes on Friday which we have been looking forward to all week! YUM!
MALDIVES	In year 1, we compared numbers in maths and in English we wrote recounts from our recent visit. Our next steps are to use conjunctions in our sentences such as 'and' or 'because.' In geography, we created keys for maps, looked at seasonal weather around the UK and compass points. In RE, we looked at belonging and what that means to Christians. In science, we continued our learning journey into animals including humans. We expressed ourselves through dance.
	We have had a fantastic half term and yet again the children have done us all proud! Have a lovely half term everybody.
NEW ZEALAND	This week in New Zealand class, we have been busy immersing ourselves in various exciting activities. In English, we focused on persuasive writing by finishing out letters to the government on behalf of Florence Nightingale, kindly requesting more supplies for her hospitals. The children did a fantastic job, showcasing their creativity and persuasive language skills.
	In Maths, we delved into the concept of doubling and halving. The children engaged in interactive exercises and games that helped solidify their understanding of these fundamental mathematical operations. They approached this challenge with enthusiasm and determination, making great progress throughout the week. In our RE lessons, we learned about the Hindu festival of Holi, which is linked to the theme of remembering. The children studied the traditions and significance of this vibrant celebration, deepening their understanding of different cultures and religious practices.
MALTA	This week in Malta class we have had a fantastic final week. On Monday, we had our R.E day. We spent the morning looking at authority and what it looks like for people/ objects to hold authority. In the afternoon, the children looked at the Torah and recognized its importance for the Jewish faith. On Wednesday, the children rounded off our topic by looking at important Egyptian gods. The children designed posters on different Gods which they displayed as part of our Egyptian museum on Thursday.
GALAPAGOS	We have had a lovely week. We have recapped crime and punishment through all the different periods of history taught as well as how crime and punishment have changed during this modern era. We've also had a very good PE lesson learning how to travel in different ways in different apparatus as well as having a go on our large climbing apparatus and some of the children overcame their fear of heights!

What	we have been learning this week
ICELAND	This term we have learnt about Anglo Saxons. We made Anglo Saxon helmets, and we had an Anglo-Saxon Workshop. I was the lucky one I got to wear Sutton Hoe Helmet. For art we made tin foil men then we covered them in mod-roc. We did a test we put salt in water and waited about 4 days. The Mr Barnes showed us how the salt became squares. We also watched a lady who made plastic from milk and vinegar. By: Beau
JAMAICA	This week in Year 6 we have had an amazing week. In English we have been doing mock SATs for SPAG. In maths we have been geometry and mock SARs for arithmetic and reasoning. In guided reading we did mock SATs. In art we made pen pots and cut out art. In history we did Mayan hieroglyphics. In science we have learnt more about evolution and adaptations. We have also done a spelling test. In this week we have also done R.E. day about Ramadan and Eid-Al-Fitr. On Tuesday the Wild Animal Heart Sanctuary came in to tell us about the White-Tailed Eagle and Steve who goes up to Scotland and gets white tailed eagle eggs and brings them to the Isle of Wight.
CUBA	This week in Cuba Class we have had a very busy week. We have enjoyed learning all about Chinese New Year. We had a go at a Chinese New Year dragon dance and made our own paper plate dragons. We have also made collage hearts for valentines and finished the week off trying out pancakes for pancake day.

Some of the children have been making up their own games to play together and have been working hard as a team to follow the rules and work together.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

Also known as Monkey Cool, this platform aims to fill the gap left by Omegle (which has now shut down) by placing users in random video chats with strangers. Participants use their mobile number and Snapchat username to connect to the service, where they can make matches, message other people and join group chats. The mobile version has been removed from the App Store due to safety concerns, but iPhone owners can still access the site via their web browser. The app remains available on Google Play, where its listing claims that Monkey has more than 30 million users worldwide.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

AGE-INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

The app claims to use AI to detect sexual content or activity that violates its policies, along with having a 24/7 moderation team. However, reports in the media continue to indicate that explicit content remains commonplace on Monkey (including sexually graphic or violent material) and is therefore accessible to anybody who uses the app – including those aged under 18.



While Monkey is free to download, it nevertheless offers in-app purchases promising to unlock access to premium features. For example, users who wish to make use of 'Knock Knock chat' (Monkey's text-based messaging option), rather than the app's Chatroulette-style random video calling feature, will need to pay to be able to do so.

DISCUSS THE DANGERS

Even if you're comfortable with your child using Monkey, it's still important to talk about the potential dangers. It's crucial, for instance, that young people recognise the risks that stem from video chatting with strangers; that they understand not to share identifying information (like their street or school name); and that they know what to do if they are exposed to inappropriate content.

RESTRICT IN-APP PURCHASING

If your child is accessing Monkey via an Android device, you can prevent them from making in-app purchases through the device's settings. If you do allow your child to use the site, we'd recommend that you enable this feature: young people have been known to spend significant amounts of money in their desire to unlock more features in apps such as this.

THE PARTY NAMED IN

REPORT INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Monkey states in the safety section of its site that "people are given the power" and that, to a large extent, Monkey is "self-governing," If a user is exposed to sexually explicit or inappropriate content on the platform, they can select the 'police' emoji in the top right corner of their screen to submit a report for Monkey's moderation team to review.

127 P SPOT THE SIGNS

If you're concerned that your child is spending too much time on Monkey – or that they may have been exposed to inappropriate or distressing content – it's important to watch for potential indications that they've been affected emotionally. They could be unusually irritable or unable to concentrate, for example, or falling to complete their homework or even to eat regular meals.







